Jaisithok School Update

In late November, we successfully reopened schools in Nepal after school closures due to the Covid-19 pandemic. All schools in Nepal are open and have been running well since reopening.

Back in December, across all UWS schools in Nepal, 93% of students returned to school (retention rate) with 79% student attendance in January, which was promising and represented the clear desire of families to see their children continue with their education, despite all the surrounding challenges. As of February, retention rates have risen to 96% and student attendance to 84% due to the success of the 'drop-out mitigation' programmes which were run by teachers and local volunteers to help engage children who did not returned to school. In March, we recorded that 103 students were enrolled at UWS Jaisithok School (56 girls). Through the first two months of the year, the students you support had recorded an average with an average monthly student attendance of 89%. Through developing customised retention plans for each 'at risk' child, we have successfully supported these children to return to school and continue with their life-changing education.

Lastly, to give more time to cover the learning material required by each School Grade and to close of some the learning gaps that last years' school closures caused, the start of the new academic year has been extended until June for this year; previously this would have commenced in April.

Meet Chaha*

Chaha* began attending UWS Badagaun School in 2018, in our Grade Four class. Now she is 9 years old and dreams of becoming a doctor.

Before we developed a school in her community, Chaha's nearest primary school was a two hour walk away. She rarely made it to school, as the long journey meant she would not have time to help her parents. They needed her to look after her younger brother while they worked, and to collect water and to feed the family's farm animals.

Now, nine-year-old Chaha has the time to study for her future and still help her family.



Chaha's father is a carpenter and occasionally earns extra money to support his family through construction work. Her mother rears animals, such as goats and hens, and grows crops on a small plot of land they own. Chaha's parents never had the opportunity to go to school.

Living in a remote village in the Gulmi region of Nepal, they have always faced extreme hardship, struggling to make enough money to survive. Without basic literacy and numeracy skills, they are trapped in a relentless cycle of poverty.

Thanks to education, the future looks brighter for Chaha.

A normal day for Chaha begins at 6am when she helps her mother collect water from the village well, which is half an hour away from her house. She also helps cut and collect fodder to feed the animals. Chaha then walks to UWS Badagaun School with her older sister, who is in the Grade 7 class there. The walk takes them ten minutes. They receive breakfast at school which helps gives them energy to take part in lessons.

Chaha told us she loves coming to school because she "enjoys learning with her friends." Her favourite subject is English. During breaktime, Chaha plays skipping games and *chungi* with her best friend.

When she is older, Chaha says that she would like to be a doctor so she can help people in need. With the support of her teachers and community, Chaha has the opportunity to follow her dream. Her education is giving her the skills she needs to continue on to secondary school and access job opportunities that were not an option for her parents.


What else has been happening in 2021?

Celebrating International Women's Day

Nepal Fellowship Training

We are always looking for ways to improve our model and further support the most at-risk students enrolled in UWS schools. In 2017, we launched the Nepal Fellowship Programme, which aims to improve the quality of teaching in UWS Schools whilst providing an opportunity for young Nepali graduates to gain valuable teaching experience and make a real impact on the lives of remote and marginalised communities.

Since then, the programme has gone from strength to strength, with Fellows taking on key leadership roles within the communities they serve, such as playing a central role in the daily <u>radio learning programme</u> during Covid-19. At the moment 15 new Fellows are completing a training course in Kathmandu, prior to their placement in a UWS school.



Keeping Children Safe

Our primary focus is always the well-being of the students, teachers and wider school communities which we support. We're delighted to have achieved Level One Certification from Keeping Children Safe (KCS), the internationally recognized child safeguarding organisation.

According to KCS, "UWS has a comprehensive framework in place that meets the International Child Safeguarding Standards for protecting children from hardships, and can respond appropriately to concerns should they occur."

We have achieved the Level One Certification for the UK office at present, and we are currently undergoing the certification process for country offices. We will continue to collaborate with KCS and other recognised humanitarian leaders to make continuous improvements to our child protection strategies in order to ensure the safety and happiness of the children we serve.













UK Aid Match: Happily Ever Smarter

Every child has the right to an education, but globally, one in every six children are still out of school.

Covid-19 has exacerbated this education crisis making it even harder to reach these children and the UN estimates that 24 million children worldwide may never return to school after the pandemic falling victim to early marriage or a lifetime of poverty. Vital progress made in access to education worldwide will be pushed back by a decade.

Our mission is to end this education crisis and get more children into education. During this time the UK government will double donations made by UK individuals so that together we can provide a life-changing education for 10,000 girls & boys for the very first time. Donations matched by the UK government will be used to support children currently out of school in Nepal. Public donations will be spent across all our projects across Myanmar, Nepal and Cambodia.
